

PLATO Course Principles of Government and Public Administration, Semester A

Course Overview

This one-semester course is intended to help you familiarize yourself with the foundations and functioning of governmental functions within the United States. This course has thirteen lessons organized into four units. Each unit has a Unit Activity and each lesson contains one or more Lesson Activities.

This course covers the history and development of the US Constitution, and the functions of government and public administration in the United States.

You will submit the Unit Activity documents to your teacher, and you will grade your work in the Lesson Activities by comparing them with given sample responses. The Unit Activities (submitted to the teacher), and the Lesson Activities (self-checked) are the major components of this course. There are other assessment components, namely the mastery test questions that feature along with the lesson; the pre- and post-test questions that come at the beginning and end of the unit, respectively; and an end-of-semester test. All of these tests are a combination of simple multiple-choice questions and technology enhanced (TE) questions.

Course Goals

This course will help you meet the following goals:

- Describe the basic concepts of authority, rights, and responsibility in government and public administration.
- Describe the philosophical and historical origin of the US government.
- Describe the history and development of the US Constitution.
- Examine the structure and functioning of the US government.
- Discuss public policy and the different groups involved in administering and influencing these policies.
- Discuss the impact of public policies on culture and different groups in the United States.
- Explore the rights and liberties of US citizens as guaranteed by the US Constitution.
- Describe the importance of voluntary individual participation in US democratic society.





 Discuss effective leadership skills that are essential in government and public administration.
